APSP Football Finals Day: Our school football season came to an end on Monday with the Football League Finals hosted by the Ashton Park Sports Partnership. We had 3 teams make it to this stage with our Year 4 and 6 competitive teams and our Year 6 Girls Development

team all earning themselves a place in this final event due to their success in the various leagues that have taken place throughout the past two terms.

Year 6 Boys: On finals day, the boys managed to qualify out of their group and earn themselves a place in the semi-final thanks to a 2-0 win against Knowle Park and a memorable 1-0 win against Headley Park in the group stage. Unfortunately, Southville were on the wrong side of a 2-0 defeat to Victoria Park (the eventual winners) in the semi-final, where on another day, the refereeing decisions could have gone in our favour. A huge well done to the team as it was a massive achievement to make it to finals day, let alone reach the semi-final stage and give the eventual winners a real closely fought match.



Y4 Boys: Having finished 2nd in the overall league standings, our Year 4 boys rightfully earned themselves a spot in the finals day on Monday. Unfortunately, the team were on the wrong side of a couple of close encounters that finished 1-0, where both teams could have easily come out on top. Once again, a huge well done to all of those children involved and hopefully they can go one step further when they go for gold again in Year 5.



Y6 Girls: Having finished 3rd out of 10 in their league, one of our Y5/6 girls teams managed to successfully earn themselves a spot at finals day. They took part in a round-robin of fixtures

against two other schools, who unfortunately, proved to be a step ahead in the 'development' phase with their teams. However, this did not stop our girls from enjoying the experience of taking part in the day, where for some of the team, it was their first encounter of taking part in real-life football matches. Well done girls!



That concludes all of our sporting events until after Easter, but a massive well done to all of those children that have taken the opportunity to represent the school in various sports so far this year. Next term, our focus turns towards cricket, where hopefully the sun starts to shine and we can also begin our preparations for the much anticipated Sports Day in Term 6!
